The notice in the picture was posted by the City of Camas last week on our trail behind the houses on Lacamas Drive in the common area biofiltration



system. It states: "Possibility of sewage contamination in this drainage area. No human or animal contact with water at this time." Apparently, a residential STEP system overflowed into the storm water system, leaking sewage. The sign is now down, but this can happen when any house above or in our neighborhood has a STEP system overflow. Please remember to check for signs before allowing your pet to drink from the area.

The Deed of Dedication is the document that recorded the transfer of a 100-foot strip of land along the southern Lacamas Lake shoreline to the City of Camas by Vanport Manufacturing, the developer of Lacamas Shores, back in



December of 1988. However, Vanport Manufacturing, Inc., (the "Grantor") expressly reserved a number of rights regarding this strip of land, currently known as the "Conservancy Zone". Among those rights are the following:

- First, the right to enter the conservancy zone to construct and maintain a biofilter storm drainage system,
- Second. the right to have private access easements for interior access to the shoreline trail by the residents of Lacamas Shores.
- Third, the right of an easement for the free and uninterrupted access and enjoyment of light and view over and across the conservancy zone for the windows and roofs of the improvements to be constructed on the real property owned by Grantor (i.e., our houses), which is adjacent to the conservancy zone, and

• Fourth, the rights necessary to accomplish the obligation of Grantor and its successor, the Lacamas Shores Homeowners Association, as contained within Section 2.7.2 of the governing Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions.

That Deed is recorded as document number 8901180151, Clark County, Washington.
